can earn up to three credits for the course.

The Graduate and Advanced Professional Program offered in the Night Division also will offer a complete summer schedule. This program is open to persons holding a Bachelor of Laws degree from an Association School. It is also open for non-degree credit to members of the State Bar of California who might not have the proper LLB for degree credit. To complete the program, twenty units are required but these can be spread over a period of several years. In addition, certain courses offered by the graduate departments of other colleges in the school may be applied toward the LL.M. To be registered for credit in one of the advanced law courses, the candidate must first present evidence of his ability to do advance work.

All of the courses offered in the Advanced Professional Program during the summer will be two unit courses and will be given one night a week from 6:30-9:30 P.M.

The courses being offered this summer include: Federal Income Tax, Arthur Manella; Estate & Gift Taxation, John W. Ervin; Labor Arbitration, Benjamin Aaron; Taxation of Trusts and Estates, Lawrence Irell; Taxation of Corporations and Partnerships, Arthur Willis; State & Local Taxation, John Nourse; Taxation of Life Insurance, Richard Forster; Legal Accounting, Max Greenberg; Legal History, Moffatt Hancock. In addition Legal Aid Clinic and Advanced Research will also be offered in the program.

Law Faculty Passes On Student Report

A recent meeting of the law school faculty considered a report submitted to it by the Student Bar Association. The administration favorably considered two of the three recommendations made by the students. The third recommendation was considered as being practiced at the present time by the professors.

The proposition unfavorably received was one which considered the appointing of two faculty members other than the class instructor to consider failing grades of any freshman, where the rest of the students grades were above 70.

Favorably considered was a recommendation for a faculty counseling service in which faculty members would be assigned a number of incoming freshmen to counsel during the first year.

Also favorably considered was a recommendation that senior students would make a written critique as to teaching methods, and subject matter, to each individual instructor.

USC Hosts State Group Conclave

The University of Southern California Student Bar Association will host the spring convention of the California Student Bar Association in the Law School building on April 28, 1951. Co-hosts with the USC group will be the law student associations at UCLA, Southwestern and Loyola. The meeting will be the first held by the group in the southland.

Present plans for the convention call for a get-to-gether party on Friday evening, April 27 under the chairmanship of USC student Don Tollefson. The Saturday meeting and luncheon will be under the direction of Bob Finch, USC Bar Association president. The banquet on Saturday night will be arranged for by Pantillis Lambrose, state vice-president.

Of prime consideration on the convention agenda will be consideration of the passing by motion bills now before the state legislature. Also to be considered will be ways and means of bettering relations between the layman, the attorney and the law student. Final consideration of the meeting will be the election of new officers for the 1951-52 year.

The evening banquet will feature the first in an annual presentation to be made by the Student group to some person who has done the most for the law student and legal profession during the past year.

Present officers of the group, which is sponsored by the California State Bar, are, Ed Kerr, editor of the Stanford Law Review, president; Lambrose, vice-president; Miss Peggy Hoyt, Boalt Hall, secretary; and Bruce Jacobs, Santa Clara, treasurer. USC delegates include, Don Tollefson, Scott McCormac, Dale Heinly, Kenneth Lewis and Mike Mayo. Additional delegates and observers to the present meeting will be appointed by the Bar Association and parties interested, particularly first year students, are requested to register at the Bar Association office.

Kalmbach Takes Over

As of that date the present incumbent, Bob Finch, will be on active duty with the Marine Corps.
